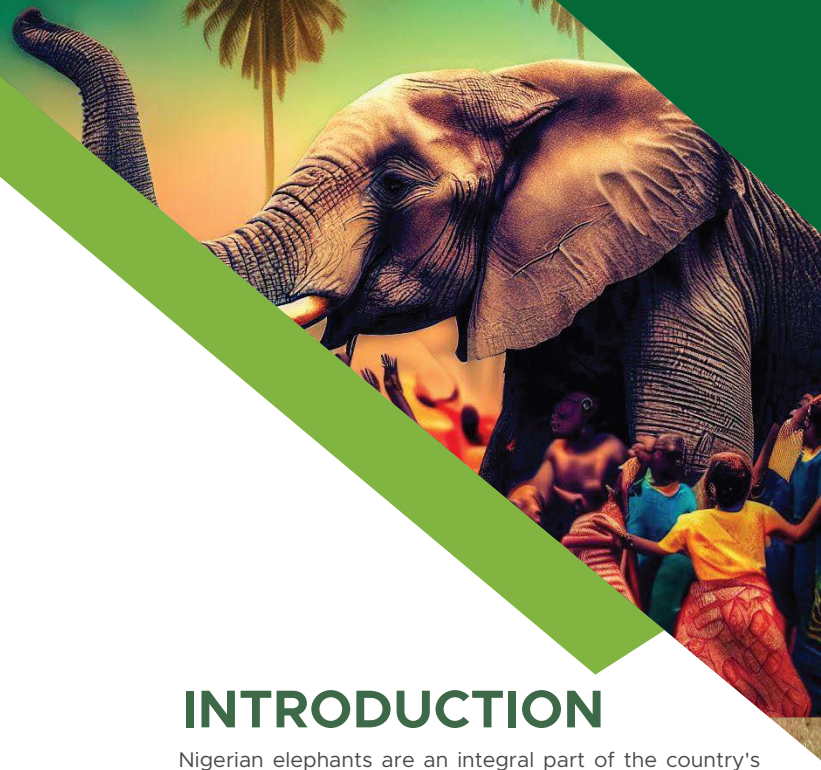


THREATS TO NIGERIAN ELEPHANTS
